Journal Policy

The Abraka Journal of Religion and Philosophy (AJRP) 2971–5989 (Print) 2971–5997 (Online) is a peer-review scholarly journal. The journal is published by the Department of Religious Studies and Philosophy, Faculty of Arts, Delta State University, Abraka, Nigeria. The Journal is published biannually (July and December) in both print and online versions. AJRP publishes original papers, reviewed papers, conceptual frameworks, analytical and simulation models, case studies, empirical research, technical notes, and book reviews in theology, religious studies and philosophy including other related areas of the Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences. Article Submission

The manuscript should include an abstract written in English of not more than 250 words as well as five or eight keywords, placed immediately after the abstract. Typically, the abstract should state the research problem, aim, methods, main findings, implications, conclusion and major recommendations of the study. Manuscript should be typed double-spaced, fully justified, in Times New Roman and Font Size 12 on A4 paper as a Word document. The manuscript size should be between 4,000 and 6,000 words (including abstract, keywords, notes, references, etc.). The documentation style adopted by the Journal for all manuscripts is the American Psychological Association (APA) 7th edition OR the Modern Language Association (MLA) 7th edition. Authors should use one style consistently. Each manuscript should be accompanied by information about the author: (1) full name (family name last); (2) institutional affiliation (3) email addresses and phone numbers. Manuscripts should be submitted as e-mail attachments in MS format to: ajrp@delsu.edu.ng and relphiljournal@gmail.com with evidence of the payment of five thousand naira for peer review. Contributors should kindly note that, as a rule. AJRP will not publish multiple articles by the same author in one issue.

The Publication Ethics

However, article publication fee for single author is **₦30,000**, while for more than two authors is **₦40,000**. Authors outside Nigeria is **\$60**.
